Notes from the President...

On December 21, 2005, an accident involving a tanker hauling diesel, gasoline, and fuel oil, occurred on M-104 in Spring Lake Township. The tanker overturned trying to avoid hitting a car that had made a u-turn on the highway. At 8:30 pm the Ottawa Sheriff and Crockery Township Fire Department requested Emergency Services assistance. North Ottawa County ARES and OCEC were paged to assist with traffic control near the scene of M-104 and 130th Avenue. I was the first on the scene and made contact with incident command to see where they wanted us deployed. There were 10 to 15 people driving to the scene, all listening to the 145.49 repeater, with Don KB8ODB and Tom KB8VEE working net control. We were able to start deployment of our people, and were on duty for 10 hours. Some volunteers had to leave during the night, but we had enough to last the night. We also had to use lights on our cars. Safety was and is the number one priority. Bill Smith approved the use of red or amber lights and the State Police never said a word. They all were about to go off duty at shift change, and they were very happy with the job we did and the way that we did it.

Just a reminder for anyone who missed the last announcement, that each Thursday night at 1900 (7 PM) local time, I will be hosting a PSK31 net on 145.570 MHz USB. I send out the call at 1500 Hz on the waterfall, so just as a bit of trivia, the actual frequency is 145.5715 MHz. I am using vertical polarization for this net, since at the moment that's all I have up, and I know many of you are in the same position.

In the future, I plan to use modes other than PSK31 as well, such as MFSK16, RTTY, perhaps even SSTV. Also, if it turns out that the use of SSB is keeping too many people out of it, I may switch to FM, or possibly start a second net.

I am located in Robinson township, between Lincoln and M-45, about 2 miles east of US-31. My antenna is a vertical dipole up about 27 feet. Expected range for those using ground planes is about 25 miles, those with beams might get in from close to 40 miles out. If some people on the fringes act as relays that range can probably be greatly extended.

You don't necessarily need a soundcard interface to get in, you can just hold your mic up to the computer speaker if you want. Having one would certainly make things easier on you though. Just cut the cord off of some old headphones, solder it to a matching plug for your rig's mic or data jack, optionally put together a PTT interface

I learned about Ham Radio... By Paul Zellar, W8IQE

I LEARNED ABOUT HAM RADIO FROM THAT!

In 1955 I wrote to the FCC, asking for information about a rumor that there was something new, a novice class amateur radio license. Instead of information, they sent me a packet that contained a form and a sealed envelope. The instructions said that I must first take the form to an amateur operator and have him testify that I was able to send and receive Morse at five words per minute. Only after that was I to take the sealed envelope to any US citizen and open it in their presence. They would certify that I had completed the enclosed written test without outside reference or assistance, then mail the test to the FCC for grading. I didn't know just what to do, not feeling prepared for this. I had only asked for information! Then I realized that I had nothing to lose by trying, so I rigged up a door bell buzzer to a key and battery. After practicing a couple of hours to help me remember the Morse that I had learned at Fort Benning, I called Huck Vanderwall, the only ham I thought of in Grand Haven. He was kind enough to invite me over and gave me the test. He didn't like the raspy buzzer, but it worked OK, so I could then take the exam to a neighbor and filled out the multiple guess answer sheet. The test was pretty basic, a few rules, procedures, and some Ohm's Law. Off it went and I soon was the proud owner of a license for WN8IQE. Now the problem was to get on the air. I had an old Hallicrafters S-38 receiver, but I was never able to get the BFO working. I copied some code just by the difference in background noise, but found it difficult. I had enough money to purchase a crystal, which cost about three hours of pay back then. Hitting the junk box I built a one tube transmitter on a wooden chassis, a true "breadboard" rig. The only proof that I had that it worked was to light a ten watt bulb connected as a dummy load. I spent many hours trying to make a contact, but never succeeded, even to another ham ten miles away that I had listening for me. I have often wondered just what frequency that rig was on!

The Novice license was only for one year, and not renewable. I knew I couldn't handle the 13 words per minute for the General license. A month after I got my ticket, another local ham got his, and that had a K prefix. I realized that I had one of the last W8 calls, and didn't want to lose it. I sent back to the FCC for a Technician class license examination, which was handled the same way as the Novice. Back to Huck for another code test with my buzzer! The written was the same as the General, and soon I could drop the N from my call. Through the Grand Haven Amateur Radio Club I was able to borrow a Red Cross owned 6 meter Gonset Communicator, and I was off and running.

The island of Providenciales recedes off the stern of Kikuyu at 7 knots on the gage under sail with our course due north magnetic. The rail is not quite in the water, wind is freshly port side abeam, clear sunny sky, seas are a light chop, and all is well. In 9 days we will hear "landho" with the opening of Chesapeake Bay appearing on the bow and the wind will be abeam again to complete the Caribbean 1500 event. The wind was not so for the entire trip. Thanks to great lee cloths and pilot berths we could sleep off watch, yet our back ends ached from sitting on teak without cushions while on watch. Thanks to Gail, Linda and I joined Fred to move his Hallberg Rassy built 37 sloop from the Caribbean Sea into more hurricane proof waters to preserve his insurance contract on the vessel. The 2006 season caused ethinking in the insurance industry about reasonable risk. The flight to the island was quite uneventful, but the first night in port turned miserable with mosquitoes as thick as flys over a "mature" carcass. Those little buggers even hid out and reappeared from the vberth two days into the trip. We daily logged trip miles and milestogo in our 1000 mile passage, but not the engine hours under sail and bare poles. The drone of pistons probably accounted for one third of the time at sea and cut 40% off the sailonly time for the trip. Fuel and water supplies were never a concern, but a wellstocked larder to keep the crews stomach happy was lacking. By trip's end we were baking biscuits for sandwiches, serving lunch meat on toothpicks, tuna salad in cups, (and chocolate? - only one small morsel a day). I'm sorry to say I did not lose any weight, but perhaps moved some of it from waist to shoulders. For the entire trip we loved the autopilot who steered a true course in all conditions. A school of perhaps 25 porpoise played on our bow on two occasions, and smaller groups a couple more times. Five minke whales passed our stern close enough to smell their bad breath. Several large whales paralleled our course 2 miles off our stbd bow but sounded before we could identify them. Jelly fish seemed to be everywhere in the warmer waters below and in the Gulf Stream. Some form of fish or mammal dogged our depth sounder to turn the 5400 meters of water into 7 to 40 feet from time to time. Even a small bird visited for a rest (and defecated on my sleeping bag) while we were out of sight of land. Every trip has it's moments with undesirable weather? Chris the event router suggested we park for a day or two to let a front pass and the Gulf tream settle down again. We did - almost. At 10am we hoveto in light winds and sunny sky just short of entering the stream. In a few hours we had rigged the inner fore stay and had hoisted the storm jib for practice. Then we waited. By late afternoon, the sky was dark and winds blew steady 20 from SW. By 9am the next day we had seen plenty of lightning, frequent gusts 35 to 43 (we watched), and rain that did a nice job of scrubbing the deck Seas were moderate - a regular 8 to 12 feet, with an occasional 14 thrown in for good measure. It was becoming uncomfortable, but at this point they were pretty regular. The boat did well laying ahull. By the following midmorning we were convinced the worst was over and we got under way again with reduced sail. After we made up the 21 miles we had drifted hove to, and entered the stream we kikuyu1. May 2006 found continued squalls and confused seas - now pretty certainly uncomfortable. The reduced canvas did little to stabilize the rolling, it did a lot to slow down progress when we were out of the squall weather. The prospect of reefingunfurling repeatedly did little for our sore bodies. So we grinned at each other and bore it. Once thru the stream the water temp fell from high 70's to low 60's and light fog showed up. But at least the sea settled down and the squalls abated about when the wind gage died. Traffic was minimal. We spotted maybe a few merchant vessels a day, mostly on the horizon. Only one hail was needed to establish passing and she altered in an overtaking situation. We did marvel at the one weather station we passed closely on stilts in 100ft of water. It was complete with horn. We discussed climbing the flights to the top for pictures, but the idea never really took hold... Say 200 miles off Hatteras on my watch around midnight I did play chicken with a fisherman. Her first set of lights looked like a sailor running under tricolor, steaming, and deck mounted running lights. Not exactly legal, but common for some in my experience. I altered to pass porttoport. Funny, that sailor altered too. My neighbor soon displayed red over white over red to dispel any illusion that she was a yacht, and darted all over the place that we really wanted to go at speeds approaching 15 knots (my estimate). This brought on at least another half dozen plus course changes for us and so it went for an hour. Finally she stopped and doused all running lights, showed cabin lights, and settled down to perhaps clean the catch as we passed a mile off on our port and well off our original rhumbline. Linda professes to be a non sailor. Technically, if that means sail selection and trim she is correct. But if that means carrying less weight on voyage it is certainly an untrue measurement. Fred the owner, and Skip the crew, were markedly better off for her presence than had she stayed ashore. She stood a trustworthy watch, sighted more than her share, cooked up a creative delight, and established an ambiance worth going to sea for. The vessel has few, if any, bad habits. The one design feature I found to be awkward was the in mast furling. To deploy or to put away sail required a set of conditions that are not easily attained without engine. To race with such a rig seems to this author to be problematic. To cruise might be a good thing. The full batten oriented vertically seemed to do a good job with sail shape, significantly better than my own experience with roller furled main on CIRCE containing no battens. The full moon passed 1/2 cycle at the same time we passed 1/2 voyage. Once within 2 miles of Hampton at 3am, we dropped the hook until next morning and slept. We were positioned out of the channel and after dawn we watched many navy ships go to sea for the day while we cleared customs by cell phone. At the dock we met the vessel Growltiger who had arrived a day earlier and had been our SSB radio contact with weather information and who posted positions to the web daily for the fleet during much of our sea time. The only other SSB contact was by ham radio to MMSN for weather on perhaps Friday afternoon. Sadly propagation on 20m did not permit contact with home town. Our member Steve Black deserves kudos for his work in organization for this event. George F. (skip) VerDuin

On the far east side of de of the park, Lou Meisch, Jef Olson and Jef's son Nate, operated their station on 15 and 80 meters. Lou had constructed a "Sturba Curtain" antenna ,22 feet high and 88 feet long, for 80 meter operation.

Don is also interested in talking with anyone interested in Packet Radio. You need a computer, a terminal node controller and a two meter radio. The Packeteers will be using 145.070 megahertz. The project could eventually work itself into E-mail.

I LEARNED ABOUT HAM RADIO FROM THAT!

In 1955 I wrote to the FCC, asking for information about a rumor that there was something new, a novice class amateur radio license. Instead of information, they sent me a packet that contained a form and a sealed envelope. The instructions said that I must first take the form to an amateur operator and have him testify that I was able to send and receive Morse at five words per minute. Only after that was I to take the sealed envelope to any US citizen and open it in their presence. They would certify that I had completed the enclosed written test without outside reference or assistance, then mail the test to the FCC for grading. I didn that know just what to do, not feeling prepared for this. I had only asked for information! Then I realized that I had nothing to lose by trying, so I rigged up a door bell buzzer to a key and battery. After practicing a couple of hours to help me remember the Morse that I had learned at Fort Benning, I called Huck Vanderwall, the only ham I thought of in Grand Haven. He was kind enough to invite me over and gave me the test. He didn the test was pretty basic, a few rules, procedures, and some Ohm's Law. Off it went and I soon was the proud owner of a license for WN8IQE. Now the problem was to get on the air. I had an old Hallicrafters S-38 receiver, but I was never able to get the BFO working. I copied some code just by the difference in background noise, but found it difficult. I had enough money to purchase a crystal, which cost about three hours of pay back then. Hitting the junk box I built a one tube transmitter on a wooden chassis, a true "breadboard" rig. The only proof that I had that it worked was to light a ten watt bulb connected as a dummy load. I spent many hours trying to make a contact, but never succeeded, even to another ham ten miles away that I had listening for me. I have often wondered just what frequency that rig was on!
