I LEARNED ABOUT HAM RADIO FROM THAT

With a Technician ticket in my pocket, I was anxious to get on the air. I had no equipment or a budget to purchase any. Through the Grand Haven Amateur Radio Club I was loaned a Red Cross owned Gonset Communicator for six meters. This was an AM transmitter/receiver with a 12 volt/120 volt power supply. It was the size of a small suitcase, and fairly heavy, it had a tunable receiver and a crystal socket for the transmitter. A homebrew ground plane antenna allowed me to reach a number of local hams and often the skip brought in stations from around the U.S. This was in 1956, at a time when all the new cars had 12 volt electrical systems. I didn t have a new car, so mine had a 6 volt battery. A second battery was mounted in the trunk and wired through a DPDT switch. In one position the second battery was in parallel with the car's battery for charging, in the other it was in series. This provided the 12 volts for the radio. The regular broadcast antenna worked pretty well, but one that could be cut for 54 inches was much better. Many of the hams used a 'three ring halo' on a car top carrier, providing horizontal polarization and better range with beam equipped base stations.

Through a swap I acquired an RME VHF152A converter, which was a tunable device that converted 2, 6, and 10 meters to 7 Mhz. This was connected to my WW2 HF receiver, a BC342. I rebuilt an old 35 foot TV tower and mounted it on the roof of the house. I had a ground plane and a halo antenna on the tower so I could work both polarities. Joe Kolenic, W8ESZ, gave me a homebrew transmitter, built right out of the ARRL Handbook. It used three tubes, two 5763s as oscillator and multipliers, and a 6146 for the power amplifier. This was just the transmitter, however, with no power supply, VFO, or modulator. It used crystals of about 8 Mhz to multiply to the 50-54 Mhz output. I racked my brains to find a way to get this transmitter on the air. An old transformer from a junked TV provided the 6 volts for the filaments, and they lit up nicely. I obtained an old commercial power supply with 866Jr mercury vapor rectifier tubes that put out 750 volts. The tubes had a lovely purple glow when they were working. I discovered the hard way that 750 volts was too much for the 5763s, although it was perfect for the 6146. An old novice transmitter had a 300 volt supply, so that was used for the lower stages. On connecting everything up I realized that I needed to turn on the 300 volts before the 750, so the power amp had some drive. OK, I just had to remember the sequence, and reverse it for switching to receive. I didn't have a meter to measure the final plate current, which needed to be 'dipped' to resonance. This was solved when I realized that off resonance the current was so high the plate of the 6146 turned cherry red. I tuned for minimum red. Now I needed to switch the antenna from transmit to receive, and another switch was used for this purpose. (Continued on next page.)

Now I had to remember to place the antenna switch in the proper position before turning on the lower high voltage, then the higher voltage. This system would provide about 75 watts of RF to the antenna, but I still needed to modulate it. For 100% modulation, I needed about a 40 watt audio amplifier. Looking through my junk, I found another military surplus device, called a TG-10 Keyer. This had been built for code instruction, having a motor driven reel for punched paper tape going through an electric eye. The signal then went through a hefty audio amplifier. Aha! The amp used a pair of 6L6s in push-pull, providing the power level I needed. The problem was that it wasn't designed for a microphone input. That was all right, I used a telephone ear-piece for a dynamic microphone, connected it to a Heathkit Audio Signal Tracer, which was really just a high gain audio amplifier, and fed it into the TG-10. The output of the TG-10 was 4 ohms, designed for a loudspeaker. To modulate my transmitter, I needed a much higher impedance. Back to the junk box, and another TV set transformer. I connected the 4 ohm output of the TG-10 to the six volt winding of the transformer, and connected the high voltage winding in series with the 750 volt power to the transmitter. A CQ brought back a station in Kalamazoo, some 70 miles away. He helped me find the right audio adjustment that sounded right.

What I wound up with worked like this: with everything in receive and wanting to transmit, I needed to first switch the receiver to standby. The antenna switch could then be operated, then the lower high voltage, then the very high voltage. Now I was transmitting. When the transmission was complete, I had to turn off the very high voltage, then the lower high voltage, switch the antenna to receive, and turn the receiver back to 'operate'. The wrong sequence had dire results!

I just loved it when a contact asked me what rig was I using!

Feb 1. I thought you all needed an update on the Expedition to Hell (Michigan) where three hardy souls will brave the elements to generate a "signal from Hell." Murphy struck early - one antenna halyard was tangled in a tree, which caused the 40 meter antenna height to be <30 feet instead of 50 feet. Then the rig wouldn't put power to the tuner, and after some sleuthing a broken coax was found and fixed. Also, alternate power from a generator wouldn't start at such a cold temperature, so we gave up and plugged into the AC mains. At least they have 110VAC in Hell!

We tried Feld Hell on 40 metres at 1900Z and 2100Z with no takers. (we thought the mode would be appropriate for the venue!) We knew the rig was working because we were making quite a few CW contacts, even with a low antenna. We didn't try 20 meters Feld Hell because of technical difficulties with one rig.

It was 2?F when we arrived in Hell, and never got above 13?F during the operation. You might say it was a cold day in Hell:) The weather was getting blustery and snowy around 2100Z, so we decided to close up at 2200Z while it was still light.

Thanks to the Arizona ScQRPions for running a nice contest. There will be a longer writeup on the AzScQRPions web site. We hope to CU during FYBO 2008. Unless things change drastically, we'll be in Hell again,

and will have a much better idea of what is needed for such an operation.

OUR HAMVENTION 2007 DAYTON OHIO

Phyllis and I arrived at the KOA Kampground on the afternoon of Friday, May 18th. We put up our two-room tent, complete with queen sized mattress, microwave, television, chairs and table. The weather was fine. It was warm and sunny, with just a little breeze, not enough to ripple a flag. Phyllis and I jumped out of bed shortly after five thirty in the morning of June 23rd, 2007. Like Joe Veldhuis said "I just got all my radio stuff together and stuck it in the car". We did the same thing, with a check list. At seven thirty we pulled into the Rycenga Park gate and saw Mark Moss, Lou Meisch, Joe Veldhuis, John Fischer and a few others already working on antennas and organizing the compound. Lou threw his weighted line to unbelievable heights to raise high wire antennas. There was an eager air of anticipation as tents were raised, and a screened in room placed next to the pavilion.

John Fischer already had coffee brewing in a thirty cup maker. The egg casserole soon appeared, courtesy of Bonnie Schippers. The food was laid out cafeteria style on the lined up picnic tables. There was also bacon, sausages, fresh fruit, bananas, strawberries and cantaloupe. and cookies. Also, water, hot chocolate and your choice of canned pop. At the appointed hour of eight thirty, All gathered at the tables to partake breakfast.

John Sundstrom led a moment of silence remembering the silent keys, who died last year. A somber moment that touched us all.

Setting up of the six radio stations continued at an industrious pace. Paul Zeller and Jim Wolter planted enough solar panels to electrify the whole encampment. Don Meyer furnished the logging programs for the whole event.

Phyllis and I made a pizza run at Little Caesars on Robbins Road, Grand Haven, shortly before 11:30. In all, we delivered eight pizzas for lunch.

When two o'clock rolled around, radio traffic began in earnest. "CQ Field day, CQ Field day, CQ Field day, W8CSO calling CQ Field day". You could almost imagine operators from all over the United States and Canada calling, all at the same time. Lou Meisch changed one of his antennas right away. He had already put up eight or nine exotic species of antennas already.

We put up a screened in room for Joe Veldhuis and his digital VHF/UHF mode transceiver. His radio was connected to a laptop computer thru a TNC.,(terminal node ontroller). Over the entrance of his screened in room, we put an "Information here " sign. Joe made us point the arrow to the dining pavilion. There, Phyllis Simmons was busy cooking supper. Don Meyer brought in a portable smoker which came in very handy heating dinner and keeping food warm for later consumption.

It was impressive to watch Joe as he contacted stations all over the country. The colored messages scrolled down his computer screen and at the bottom of the screen you could see active transmissions in the shape of a "waterfall".

Mark Moss mounted a military surplus portable tripod antenna, for Joes digital station. Then he moved to the "field" for his two and six meter station. He was pretty lonely during most of the contest. Asked if he had any comments about six meters, he said "Yeh, six meters is dead". Even so, he managed to get more than 33 contacts around the country.

Into the evening and night the contacts continued. Lou Meisch raised a broadband 80 meter dipole antenna constructed around 3" rings to look like a long tube. His first two attempts at contacts brought two out of state radio operators answering him. During the night, the park sprinkler system activated. Lou had puddles inside his tent, but fortunately no damage was done. Lou had prudently removed his radios.

President John Fischer and others, ran a hot twenty meter station in Lou Meisch's trailer. John Sundstrom racked up a contact in Greenland. During the night, between 11:45 PM and 1:30 AM Sunday, Don Smith and Don Meyer contacted one hundred and fifty stations. The contacts came so fast the two operators didn't even have to call CQ They just let the operators pile up . After 1:20 AM Don Meyer said "Don I can't even say the words anymore. Its time for you to transmit and I'll log."

Over at the satellite receiving station, "Skip" George Verduin fervently tried to contact one of the orbiting satellites. Hour after hour he pursued the orbiting radio stations. Some of them were going in excess of seventeen hundred miles per hour. An internet program gave the locations and orbits of the targets. Skip used a large protractor and a home made rotor with his home made multi element yagi antenna to aim at the satellites. Silence or static resembling the raster sound of a TV set after the station goes off the air was his only reward. Then sometime after nine o'clock in the evening, The static noise was heard again, then a beeping noise. We got excited right now and crowded around the receiver. several hams gathered to hear the new contact. The beeps got louder. Then someone looked around the crowd. Lou Meisch was making hissing and beeping noises in his hand held transceiver. He had programmed his radio to the same frequency as the satellite receiver.

The next morning Skips patience was rewarded with an actual contact. Sometime around 10:30 AM, Skips CQ resulted in a brief conversation with a 2A station out west on satellite VO52.

Gordon Stockhill, stalwart of the CW world, manned his 40 meter CW Station. It was located on the west side of

the park, Gordon had his trailer and the weather permitted him to operate outside, beneath the shade of his "veranda". Jim Wolter gave a hand with amazing speed making the continuous wave sound like a machine gun spitting out messages.

Every one had his own plan for survival in the "wilderness" Phyllis and I flaked out in the back of our suburban, just before midnight, There was so much equipment in the truck, Phyllis was able to stretch out to sleep. On the other hand, I didn't have enough room to lay every thing flat on the bed. So I alternated between laying my legs flat on the bed and sitting up and laying down with my back flat and my legs in the air.

When two in the afternoon came around, most of us were ready to return to civilization. We found our equipment ,took down those beautiful antennas, repacked our vehicles and bid goodbye to Field Day for another year. Thanks to the named and unnamed helpful individuals at this event. Everyone gave one hundred and ten percent, I am sure that some worthy amateurs were inadvertently missed in my recollection of the things that happened here. For that omission, I apologize. All of us left with a sense of regret for leaving Field Day for the "real world". We also resolved to make ourselves better for the next year. Till then,

A new computer has been set up for the SSTV radar image server, far more powerful (not to mention stable) than the one it replaced. This extra computing horsepower has given us the ability to add an interesting feature: a store-and-forward repeater. Currently, the plan is to have this available for general use when there is no threatening weather present, then switch back to the radar mode when something is likely to happen (or /is/ happening).

Here's how it works:

- 1. You tune your rig to 445.125 MHz FM
- 2. Transmit a 1750 Hz tone (the "1750" button in MMSSTV, the musical note button in QSSTV)
- 3. If the repeater heard you, it will send a "K" in response. After you hear the "K", send your picture.
- 4. After the picture is finished, the repeater will retransmit it.

I just gave it a test by sending a picture of a chicken:

That was with 4 watts to a horizontal antenna from my QTH in Robinson township. Not too bad for a start...

So there you have it, enjoy!



Amateur Radio satellites from your Mobile FM rig. There are 7 satellites you can work from your mobile FM rig,

including PCSAT-1 which should fully recover by this weekend and last for 2 or more weeks. So now is the time to get going with live satellite contacts via these easy FM satellites, or setting up a SATGATE (Igate).

DOWNLINK SATELLITE

145.825 ISS APRS digipeater, 145.825 PCSAT-1 (recovery expected 3 Nov)

145.825 ANDE-1 (re-entry expected next month), 435.225 GO-32 +/- 10 KHz and 9600 baud

435.300 AO-51 *FM Voice* +/- 10 KHz, 436.795 SO-50 *FM Voice* +/- 10 KHz

436.795 AO-27 *FM Voice* +/- 10 KHz, As you can see, there will be over 40 passes per day with 18 for the 1200 baud satellites, 6 per day for the 9600 baud GO32 and 18 for the voice birds.

All 1200 baud pass times are between about 6 AM to 1800 local sun time in the Northern Hemisphere.

GO-32 and AO-51 voice birds are in the morning and evening, AO-27 is in the afternoon. It is trivial to know when to operate these birds WITHOUT A PC. The path for GO-32 is VIA 4XTECH and uses two different uplinks: 145.85 for APRS software and messages.145.93 for all Mic-E, D7 and D700 radios. That's more than one pass per hour on 145.825.
