

NOARC helped add 8 new Technician Class licensees to the ranks of amateur radio operators at the Ham-in-a-day class on January 26. Congratualtions to each of them and a special ATTABOY to Jim Miller, KD8FCV for his upgrade to General. This was our largest class to date. Thank to all who helped, 73, John KC8UNY.

The January meeting was an informal affair centered on Phyliss's terrific baked goods. An assembly line was put in place for TeNeKees to replenish the dwindled inventory. Joe was the lucky one with the 50/50 raffle, and also showed us his 12 meter beacon transmitter he had constructed from an old CB radio.

There was a discussion about NOARC supplying hand-held radios for public events and emergencies. Currently when a radio is needed a borrowed unit may be available, but its presence is uncertain.

Don Meyer, who heads most of the scheduled events, finds that often someone either forgets to bring their HT, doesn t have one, or it has failed for some reason. Borrowed radios often need some analyzing to determine how to change frequencies or modes. He has suggested that if 10 to 12 HTs were set aside for this use, the programming would be identical and make instructions for their use much easier. The HTs should also be equipped with a dry cell battery pack to back up the rechargeable, and preferably a remote speaker/mike.

Paul Zellar suggested the club go on a hunt for some Radio Shack HT-202 'bricks", which may be found at swap meets or are languishing in a corner of many ham shacks. Jim Miller countered with a suggestion that several service clubs and businesses might be willing to purchase radios for this purpose if their name were put on them. In that case, new radios should be purchased.

The discussion of the HTs ended with the decision to put the matter before the NOARC membership, many of whom are seeking solace in warmer climes. So here it is:

Should NOARC furnish 12 HTs with their accessories for the purpose of using them for public service events and emergencies? The units could be purchased with club funds or a drive could be formed to obtain the funds from other organizations or individuals. Also, if that decision is affirmed, should new radios be purchased or should used ones be obtained?

The meeting ended when the cookies ran low.

NOARC Meeting 2/28/08

Prior to arriving at our normal meeting place, Joe N8FQ called on the radio and told us that the meeting location had been changed to room OF9 because our normal meeting room was being occupied by another group. I met John KC8UNY in the parking lot to help bring in the coffee pot and cookies. When John arrived in the lot he pointed at his radio and asked if I wanted a shot... I asked him what he had going and he let me listen to the radio. HR2DMR was calling CQ on 14.246 and had a little pile up going. I listened for a few minutes before putting out my call. I put out my call and DMR immediately responded with a signal report. I gave him a 59 and signed off. Thanks to John, I made my first DX contact, mobile no less!

We made our way into the school and found our room. I ran off to get water for coffee, and John put out the cookies. Joe was working with his computer in preparation for our APRS demonstration. While this was going on others started to trickle into the room. Joe started giving an informal demonstration of APRS on his computer and some of the code he used for his APRS tracking program on his website

At 1950 John KC8UNY got the meeting started with 8 members in attendance. John opened with a discussion about Field Day. He said that we are looking at a new location and is thinking that Coast Guard Park in Ferrysburg would be a good location. Other locations were discussed and the topic was left open for discussion at a later meeting. John also mentioned that we could possibly have a steak dinner one night, all eyes in the room got a little brighter and everyone smiled.

Don KB8ODB said it would be nice to see more community interest by the club members. It would be nice if we could find a way to organize locally when things happen. He suggested a secondary frequency that we could check in to and use as a local coordination frequency. An example was given that in the event of a condition red Skywarn event you are unable to contact net control to coordinate observation locations. The ARRL is offering various items for sale that relate to Field Day, one of those is a t-shirt for \$12.95. John said that shipping is reduced for a quantity order, and thought that the shirts would look nice. Don KB8ODB looked on the ARRL website and mentioned that there were pins for \$5, and water bottles for \$3.95 also offered.

John suggested that the club hold another Ham-in-a-day class in the summer time. He said that there may be more interest because school is out and this would give more time to study for the test.

Gordon KA8UQT mentioned that Central Dispatch was confirmed to be moving to West Olive near the Fillmore Street complex. A brief discussion ensued regarding the cooperation between amateur radio and central dispatch, and what would become of the equipment at the current central dispatch location.

Gordon also inquired if there was any progress made in the method used to call out members for emergency events. John KC8UNY advised that there has been no progress made yet, and that we should still monitor our radios.

John thought of something new for this year, and that was to have a person "in charge" of each station, a person to coordinate operators and operating times. That way nobody will have to be responsible for more than one station. He mentioned that this had been happening to a lesser extent in past years, but thinks it would be a good thing to try for this year.

Don also mentioned that it would be nice to have a response vehicle of some sort to use as a portable headquarters to be used in the event of activation. A couple of ideas were passed around the group, including using a used Harbor Transit bus and a used trailer.

John KC8UNY said that there is Skywarn training next month on March 27th and this will take the place of the normally scheduled club meeting.

At 2107 Gordon KA8UQT said that he had about as much of my coffee as he could stand and made a motion to adjourn; I quickly agreed that the coffee was of miserable quality and seconded. There were no objections.

JUNE MEETING AND FIELD DAY REPORT

At 6:00 PM on Thursday June 26th NOARC held its regularly scheduled meeting at the Coast Guard Park in Ferrysburg. The purpose of the meeting was to hold a hot dog roast and plan for the coming Field Day, the following Saturday. The weather was perfect. We planned what stations would transmit and where they would be located. We returned home to prepare and anticipate the weekend. Saturday came. Eyes were on the weather radar watching for the coming rain storm. Phyllis and I set our alarm for 5:30AM. She bounced out of bed right away. I took longer. We finished packing the suburban. It had more stuff in it than we did when we took the boat to Florida. When 7:30 rolled around, we were off to the Coast Guard Park.

President John Fischer was already there. He had loaded "Skip" Verduin's satellite antenna in the back of his truck from Don Meyer's house the previous night. Phyllis soon took over the "kitchen" and dining area. This consisted of a pavilion with a permanent roof and concrete floor. A large steel grill was next to the picnic tables. Roger added "ambience" by lighting Hawaiian style bamboo torches at the tables. Additional candles in bowls were lit in a vain attempt to discourage mosquitoes and flies.

Soon, the more ardent radio operators arrived on location. At 8: 00 AM breakfast was served. On the menu, Mc Donald's egg, cheese and sausage or bacon and biscuits were complemented with honey dew and cantaloupe. This was all washed down with coffee, hot chocolate and bottled water. About that time we broke out the ice boxes with cold pop. Tea was available, but I didn't see anyone drinking it.

Next came the business of raising antennas and setting up radio stations. Groups of hams labored together to work and watch Lou Meisch fling his antenna support lines over the tallest trees in the park. He lost one of his weights in the woods right away. Lou had a back up plan, however. Soon he was seen pitching a short length of chain over the tall limbs.

Mark Stern and Roger used Mark's sling shot to propel a lead weight over the trees and into the woods. It was only by good fortune and the lead being painted that it was found.

Gordon Stockhill worked CW on the forty meter band in Lou's trailer. He used a forty meter dipole antenna and made over a hundred contacts around the country. He was later joined by Jim Wolter and Joe Veldhuis. Joe worked a digital keyboard in CW mode. Lou Meisch primarily worked in a tent, located in the middle of a large field, He operated phone on the fifteen and eighty meter "V" beam antenna. It was hanging some 35 feet over the landscape. Jim Miller and others also assisted. Don Meyer brought a popup camper trailer. This became a twenty meter station with an antenna called a "Lazy H". Don worked with John Sundstrom, Ben Docter,Greg Schippers and Craig Christilaw. It should be mentioned that Craig brought the clubs adopted mascot. Emma, a venerable golden Labrador retriever, supervised all operations and greeted visitors to the park. Ross Gates brought a large tent. Joe Veldhuis operated in VHF and UHF digital modes at that station.

Mark Stern and Roger set up their Coleman two room, tent as an eighty meter, mostly CW, GOTA station. The GOTA (Get On The Air) station was meant to get interested visitors and operators, not quite familiar with operating in a contest, a chance to get experience. A successful home made "Sky Loop" 272 feet long was raised over the site. The antenna was made of telephone wire. Small groups of amateurs moved around the compound. They helped string antennas, carried equipment and helped wherever possible. Extension cords were planted. They pulled on ropes, wires and set up computers for logging contacts. All radio transmissions were powered by batteries. The batteries were charged by solar panels. Most of these were brought, including portable lights, by Paul Zellar. Paul set up a large battery charging station, complete with a dolly to move those heavy batteries. Thank You Paul !!. Soon it was lunch time. Phyllis ordered six pizzas from Little Caesars. There was still pop in the ice boxes, coffee, tea and fresh fruit left over from breakfast, Guys remarked that they were still full from breakfast. They devoured the pizzas anyway.

Two O'clock in the afternoon sneaked up on the group. That was the moment the contest to make the most radio contacts in 24 hours began. The air was humming with RF. As the afternoon drifted by, we enjoyed sunshine and clear blue skies. Then the sky turned partly cloudy, Cumulus clouds scudding across the horizon soon turned to cumulonimbus. As dinner time approached, Joe Veldhuis began calling out radar weather reports from Ross Gates 'now wind blown tent. "The storm will hit us in twenty minutes" etc. The sky now turned dark as the ominous weather front approached. It started to rain and the wind picked up. The families of the operators gathered and took cover under the roof of the pavilion. Then came the really heavy wind and rain. Ross' tent, with Joe Veldhuis in it started to blow away. Three or four stakes were ripped from the ground as Ben Docter and others tried to replace them and reanchor the tent.

Phyllis was grilling hamburgs on the grill just outside of the shelter. She complained that the rain was putting out the fire in the grill. Roger hastily dumped the remaining charcoal on the smoldering coals and Phyllis continued to grill in the rain. Soon the burgers were done and nineteen of the twenty hams and their families sat down to a great pot luck dinner. Joe Veldhuis refused to leave the windblown tent until the fierce wind let up. The menu consisted of beef and turkey burgers, fruit salads, potato salads, deviled eggs, four bean salad, green seven layered salad, zucchini bread, cookies and cake. The rain stopped after dinner. The flies and mosquitoes returned. Tom Vandermel, District 6 Emergency Coordinator and Bill Smith, Director of Ottawa County Office of Emergency Management visited. As mentioned before, Don Meyer, Assistant Emergency Coordinator with NOARC was responsible for computer operations. He collected all contacts made during the contest. He and President John Fischer submitted them to the ARRL.

Sometime around one thirty in the morning, Don Meyer and Roger made twelve phone contacts using the eighty meter loop antenna. We gave it up around three thirty for a couple hours rest. The dawn came bringing a beautiful morning and a pancake breakfast. There was coffee, hot chocolate, oatmeal and plenty of Mountain Dew. Paul Zellar brought a welcome box full of doughnuts and rolls. There was also fresh strawberries and syrup for the pancakes. The hams stayed long enough to eat. Then it was back to the radios for more contacts.

Time passed very fast. As one operator put it: "At 2:00 PM, the contact who was on the air transmitted QSL and QRT!! ". Then all the frequencies went dead at the same time. It was eerie.

We apologize for any omissions in this account. There was no intent to leave out any names of the great members of the NOARC. All were enthusiastic helpful contributors. You know who you are. You helped set up the stations, contributed equipment, from the food service to the take down of all that equipment and clean up when it was over.

Our sincere thanks to all who showed up and all who served to make it a successful event.



ELECTRIC CAR INFORMATION by Paul E. Zellar, W8IQE

Converting a car to electric requires an electric motor to replace the gas engine, an adapter to mount the motor on the transmission, and another adapter to mount the flywheel/clutch assembly onto the motor shaft.

Also needed are a speed controller with a "potbox" that will connect to the accelerator pedal linkage, a contactor to turn the power on and off, the batteries with their mounts, and a charger. Useful but not required is a DC to DC converter to keep the auxiliary 12 Volt battery charged from the main battery. The cables are usually welding wire of 00 size.

Check out these suppliers: electroauto.com offers books, Convert It for \$25 +\$5 s&h, and the conversion manuals for their Voltsrabbit or Voltsporsche. A universal conversion kit sells for \$6425 + \$215 s&h, Voltsrabbit kit is \$9995 + \$215 s&h. Voltsporsche kit is \$12545 +\$600 s&h.

Evparts.com has kits for a Geo Metro/Sprint for \$7855, deluxe for \$10150. They also have one for an S10 truck for \$8000, or \$9000 deluxe. Expect to provide the car, labor and the batteries are not included!

Most suppliers recommend a minimum of 96 Volts for the drive system. My choice of 48 Volts was made because I had a motor for that voltage. The motors included in the kits sell for about \$1800.

My car began life as a 1992 Toyota Paseo, a sporty version of the Tercel. While it will go faster, I have not exceeded 45 MPH with it as yet. Just as in a gasoline car, higher speeds and accelerations reduce the range. The car has a range of 25 to 30 miles if the current is held down. I try to drive it so the current is under 100 Amps, usually I can keep it about 75. Climbing hills and accelerating, of course, demand more, especially if the speed is kept up. Golf cart batteries should deliver 75 Amps for over an hour. Mine are rated for 105 minutes at that current.

My cost of construction took about \$2000, plus about \$1000 in parts I had from the junk box. I did not keep track of the time spent on it, but estimate it at well over 100 hours.

The payoff is the cost of electricity versus the cost of gasoline. My best estimate is that at present fuel prices the car delivers the equivalent of about 200 miles per gallon.
